THE HEALTH OF MOTHERS AND BABIES DURING COVID-19, A PRIORITY IN 2021

In the countries where we work, the COVID-19 pandemic adversely affected an already fragile health situation. Enfants du Monde continued to work alongside the Ministries of Health in Bangladesh, Burkina Faso and El Salvador to improve the health of pregnant women and newborns. Read on to find out how we worked with our local partners.

EDUCATING FOR IMPROVED HEALTH

Information for the villages

In 2021, in Bangladesh, health education activities with **BRAC**, our partner in the field, were still largely disrupted due to COVID-19. Information sessions for pregnant women organised by village health workers took place, but with numbers limited to 10 participants.

"It was my mother-in-law who told me about the health education sessions for pregnant women.

I learned that it was important to attend prenatal visits in the community clinics and that we should not give birth at home because it can be risky if there are complications."

Training of healthcare personnel

In Madagascar, to improve maternal and neonatal care and to respond to the pandemic, we trained 30 staff at the Ambanja District Hospital in sensitive care, in partnership with the Geneva University Hospitals (HUG).

Prevention of malnutrition using local produce

In Madagascar, in cooperation with the Italian NGO Co.P.E (Cooperation for the Development of Emerging countries), we set up an **education project in nutrition, in three of the schools in the town of Ambanja.**

Using games and educational activities teachers can pass on to children and their parents the principles of healthy eating habits and nutritious food based on local produce, with the aim of preventing malnutrition.

INFLUENCING NATIONAL HEALTH POLICIES

El Salvador: our programme report

“Since 2006, Enfants du Monde has supported the Ministry of Health in El Salvador with the aim of improving the health of women and babies. Our programme in this country (completed in June 2021) has had a real influence on the health system. We can be proud of the results of this approach of working alongside the government”, confided Beata Godenzi, Secretary General.

In the 2000s, El Salvador experienced a maternal mortality rate (death of women during pregnancy, before and after giving birth) which was amongst the highest in Central America. One of the government's priorities was to reform the health system by making basic care freely available and by deploying health teams to the nearest rural populations. The aim was to tackle the avoidable causes of mortality, to reduce pregnancies among adolescent girls, and to improve the health of women as well as newborns.

The Health Ministry then requested our support in promoting community involvement. In view of the positive results obtained in 2 then 8 municipalities, this approach was extended to all levels of the health system from 2010. **8,894 Ministry of Health staff were trained** between 2018 and 2021.

Today, **the health-promoting principles that we uphold are integrated into national policies, and communities are involved in decision-making throughout the country in 14 departments and 262 municipalities.** Materials developed with technical support from Enfants du Monde are used in training healthcare personnel.

Between 2014 and 2021, **417,000 pregnant women and young mothers and 421,000 newborns** benefited from this health programme.

DIGITAL HEALTH

In 2021, we continued with our actions to promote maternal and infant health. We worked with a methodology developed jointly with the World Health Organization (WHO), mainly using conversations with local populations to analyse their needs and collect their suggestions.

PANDA telemedicine System

In Burkina Faso, Enfants du Monde developed together with the Ministry of Health, the company Terre Innovative and FCD (Foundation for Community Development), **the PANDA system** (Pregnancy and Newborn Diagnostic Assessment) in order to **standardise and improve the quality of care** and thus reduce the mortality of pregnant women and babies. Designed for healthcare personnel in local health centres, the PANDA application guides them through every stage of a prenatal visit and alerts them to the patients' risk factors. In 2021, the PANDA system was tested in the Koupéla health district and proved to be valuable in improving prenatal checks.

Application “My baby and me”

The free application “My baby and me” was developed in 2020 by Enfants du Monde with the Burkina Faso Ministry of Health, our local partner IPC/BF, Terre Innovative, the University of Ouagadougou and the Geneva University Hospitals (HUG). It informs women about pregnancy, birth, the postnatal period and COVID-19. Downloaded by pregnant women directly onto their mobile telephone during their visit to the health centre, the application is then able to function without internet connection in remote rural areas. Thanks to **illustrations and audio messages in 7 local languages (Moore, Diaoula, Fulfulde, etc.,** information is accessible to all women, literate or not. **In 2021, in Burkina Faso,** in our 8 intervention districts, **more than 23,800** pregnant women, young mothers and family members **used “My baby and me”.**

In El Salvador, a Spanish version of “My baby and me” has been developed in partnership with the José Simeón Cañas American University Centre, the El Salvador Ministry of Health, the Fundación Maquilishuatl organisation, the HUGs and the company Terre Innovative.



EDUCATION

Giving disadvantaged children quality education

RESULTS

In 2021, Enfants du Monde was able to...

- ▶ support **4 education programmes** for **89,891 learners (children and adults)** and train **2,242 teachers and their trainers** in Burkina Faso, Niger, and Guatemala.
- ▶ carry out **2 mandates** on behalf of the Swiss Cooperation in Chad and Niger to improve the quality of national education systems for **570,345 schoolchildren** and train **14,237 teachers and trainers**.
- ▶ provide emergency aid for **862 children and 926 adults in Guatemala**.

These programmes, with the exception of the Education Without Delay projects, are co-financed by the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC), Federal Department of Foreign Affairs (FDFA).

PROVIDING EDUCATION FOR CHILDREN IN EMERGENCY SITUATIONS

In 2021, the closure of schools in **Guatemala and Burkina Faso** had an impact on the learning and wellbeing of children. Natural disasters or armed conflicts both adversely affected the education of schoolchildren. In an often difficult situation, we continued to endeavour to provide quality education safely, and to offer children a better future.

IMPROVING THE QUALITY OF EDUCATION

Training in bilingual teaching

In Guatemala, a 14-week certified training course in “contextualisation and educational diagnosis” developed by Enfants du Monde in partnership with the San Carlos University was attended in 2021 by 31 school principals, teachers, and staff from the *Sistema Nacional de Acompañamiento Escolar*.

Teaching in the local language and in French to facilitate learning

Since 2017, Enfants du Monde has been working with the **Ministry of National Education, Literacy and Promotion of National Languages (MENAPLN)** in Burkina Faso and with local partners towards long-term improvement of the quality of teaching in around 10% of bilingual state schools.

In these schools, lessons are taught both in French, the official language of the country, and in the local language, spoken by children in the area. Bilingual schools integrate **practical activities based on the everyday life of the children**, as well as content linked to indigenous cultural values.

In 2021, Enfants du Monde **developed a textbook and new educational content in languages and mathematics** for 7P pupils. More than **180 teachers received training** in the principles, tools and methodology of bilingual teaching; **over 60 trainers and education mentors were trained** in designing course materials.

SUPPORTING CHILDREN, TEACHERS AND FAMILIES

Providing emergency aid after a natural disaster

In Guatemala, at the end of 2020, hurricanes caused extensive damage in the **Alta Verapaz region where we run an education programme**. With CIPREVICA, our local partner, we provided aid for **400 families including 1,200 children**, who had lost everything in the flooding.

With funding support from Swiss Solidarity, we were able to distribute **soap, 1,692 food parcels** so that families had enough to eat, **packs of local seeds, as well as chickens and pigs** to restore the subsistence economy. **Nearly 800 children** benefited from **psychological support and recreational activities** to help them overcome the trauma of the disaster and its consequences.

Ensuring continuity in teaching, remotely

In Central America, **Guatemala was one of the countries most affected by the COVID-19 pandemic**. Schools remained closed throughout 2021. During this time, Enfants du Monde was involved in the emergency plan *“Aprendo en Casa y en Clase”* set up by the Ministry of Education to provide support for pupils as well as teachers, for home-based lessons.

Enfants du Monde developed, in collaboration with the Ministry of Education and the General Directorate for Bilingual and Intercultural Education (DIGEBI), **self-learning guides and radio broadcasts in Maya and Spanish, in addition to distance training for teachers.**

Educating displaced children

Burkina Faso has been facing, since 2016, recurring attacks from armed groups across almost the whole country. This growing climate of insecurity places the population in a precarious situation; more than 1.5 million displaced people and **3,405 closed schools** at the end of 2021, that is **nearly 15% of the educational establishments in Burkina Faso***, affecting more than **500,000 pupils.**

To respond effectively to the urgent need to educate displaced and vulnerable children, and those in deprived communities, Enfants du Monde and local partners Andal and Pinal, the Foundation for Community Development in Burkina Faso and the Tin Tua Association, coordinated **two education in**

emergencies projects thanks to invaluable support from the **global fund Education Cannot Wait**, in areas of the country particularly affected by violence and insecurity.

In 2021, **emergency classrooms** were opened in support of host schools often without sufficient capacity to accommodate displaced children. **Remedial classes** were organised for nearly **6,000 pupils**. Over **5,000 textbooks** in local languages (Moore, Fulfulde, Jula, Gulmatchema) were distributed.

Further measures were launched to encourage school attendance. **Protective masks for the pupils were also distributed** to prevent COVID-19 from affecting school activities. **School supplies, menstrual hygiene**


kits for the girls, or bicycles, enabling children living in remote areas to attend school, were also proposed.

The project also helped families to **obtain birth certificates and identity cards** so that children could be enrolled in school.

In an area where malnutrition is acute, **school canteens** enabled more than 14,000 pupils to benefit from at least one meal a day.

Finally, community groups for **child protection** were created. ■

SUSTAINABLE IMPROVEMENT IN THE NATIONAL EDUCATION SYSTEM IN NIGER AND CHAD

The expertise of Enfants du Monde in the field of quality education is recognised by the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC), which awarded us two very significant mandates in Niger and in Chad. The AFD (French Development Agency) is also a partner in Chad.

QUALITY EDUCATION FOR OUT-OF-SCHOOL YOUNG PEOPLE IN NIGER

With our partner Swisscontact, we work within the **Community Centres for Alternative Education (CCEAJ)**, which receive young people aged between 9 and 14 who are out-of-school or have dropped out. Here they learn to read, write, and count in two languages (their mother tongue and French, the official language of Niger), while being directed towards vocational training or continuing their studies.

Responding to a growing need

This educational strategy, focused on finding out about trades, is an in-depth response to the needs of both commu-

nities and young people; as a result, **at the start of the 2021-2022 school year**, education centres registered over **3,000 new enrolments**. The 315 centres in existence today total **8,183 young people, of which 52% are girls**.

Reinforcing the teaching skills of teachers

In 2021, **345 teachers** were trained in designing motivational courses for pupils. For example, the content of reading and writing exercises, or natural science activities, is developed directly from contributions made by professionals in key sectors of the local economy such as metal-working, catering or market gardening.

guides were produced for CM2. A total of **107,761 course books** were distributed in the **2,441 schools** in the 4 provinces where we work.

Cascade training for the whole education chain

Enfants du Monde reinforces the skills of key professionals in the education chain (for example, education facilitators with responsibility for continued training, or trainers from the teacher training college), so that they in turn pass on their knowledge to teachers.

In 2021, we trained nearly 400 key members of staff in **learning assessment** and oral teaching in primary school, and almost 50 people in **producing educational radio programmes**. More than 300 education facilitators and nearly 7,700 teachers were trained in **using new textbooks**. Finally, more than 2,000 school principals in the 4 provinces where we work were trained in **participatory governance** in collaboration with the Primary Education Directorate (DEF).

“Focusing on trades at the CCEAJ inspired me to do vocational training. I couldn’t see the point of the lessons in primary school.”

Djafarou, aged 23, was trained at the CCEAJ in Tibiri. After two years of training in metal construction, he is now earning his living.

TEXTBOOKS TRANSFORMING TEACHING METHODS IN CHAD

Enfants du Monde is improving the national education system in a sustainable way, mandated by the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC) and the French Development Agency (AFD), in 4 regions: Moyen-Chari, Batha, Mandoul and Wadi Fira.

Developing teaching materials adapted to local cultures

In 2021, a textbook was developed for children aged between 9 and 11 from CM1 and CM2 year groups, and 3 teacher’s

CHILDREN SPEAK OUT ABOUT THEIR RIGHTS

Enfants du Monde launched the project *A Fairer World* in Geneva classrooms. This project aimed to reinforce children's knowledge about their rights and culminated with their participation in an event on 20th November, International Day for Children's Rights.

An interactive approach

As part of the project "*A Fairer World*", Enfants du monde offered teachers in French-speaking Switzerland a resource handbook to help **children aged between 8 and 12 discover their rights. In 2021, 293 children aged 8 to 12** from 18 schools worked on exploring the Convention on Children's Rights and choosing 10 rights, then discussed the issues related to applying them. Each child was encouraged to take a photo and produce a slogan on a particular right which was important to them.

A Giant Globe and a Virtual Globe for children's rights

The children's creations were then displayed at Place des Nations in Geneva on a Giant Globe, as well as on its equivalent on line, the Virtual Globe (www.edm.ch/globe-virtuel). Visitors can discover the views of children from Switzerland, Burkina Faso, Benin, and Guatemala on their rights.

The Children's Voice Festival

On the International Day for Children's Rights, Enfants du Monde invited children taking part in the project "*A Fairer World*" to attend the Children's Voice Festival at Place des Nations in Geneva, together with the press cartoonist and goodwill ambassador Patrick Chapatte.

On 19th November, 80 schoolchildren from French-speaking Switzerland shared their vision on rights which were important to them, producing a **tree of recommendations, as well as a giant fresco**, with the help of Patrick Chapatte.

The recommendations, as well as those **from schoolchildren in Burkina Faso**, were then shared with members of the UNO Committee on children's rights and the Geneva authorities.

6 rights were strongly supported by the children: the right to play, the right to live with their family, the right to equality, the right to be protected, the right to attend school and the right to a private life.

On 20th November, 350 people including 170 children were able to see the children's creations from the previous day and to explore children's rights through art workshops, story-telling and board games. Reports produced by young people from Neuchâtel on the rights of the child were also displayed. ■




FINANCIAL PROGRESS OF EDM

FINANCIAL SUMMARY 2021

2021 fiscal year analysis


In 2021, with a view to taking sustainable and scaled-up action, Enfants du Monde and its partners on the ground continued with programmes set up in priority intervention countries. New opportunities opened up, both in intervention locations (Madagascar) and in new areas (education in emergencies).

The level of income received decreased compared with 2020, a year in which we received exceptional funding in order to establish COVID-19 information and prevention activities. Some funders reviewed their intervention strategy, however new financing was obtained and investment in fund-raising from the general public bore fruit (over 1 million CHF received!).

Measures taken in 2020 to adapt programmes to the pandemic situation, to limit its impact on beneficiaries and to ensure the safety of personnel and partners were maintained. Some of Enfants du Monde's intervention regions such as the Sahel regained some normality, but other countries had to deal with a rise in the infection rate, preventing some activities (lock-down in Bangladesh from June to August 2021 particularly preventing social gatherings, closure of schools in Guatemala). Enfants du Monde amended its activities as a result. Project payments (including mandates) therefore decreased in 2021 in most of our regions with the exception of Burkina Faso, where funds were received to take action in education for emergencies, especially regarding internally displaced people. Fund-raising and administration costs were still very well managed (8% of total costs).

The year 2021 therefore shows earnings of CHF 140,932.- before allocation of funds. However mandate payments allocated to the free capital, in addition to the use of part of available funds from previous years to cover annual costs, have resulted in a final balance deficit after allocation of funds of CHF 38,268.-, covered by the free capital of the association. The latter received CHF 269,966.- from the year's activities, and thus remains sufficient and substantial.
