I joined the Enfants du Monde Committee in mid-2022. Experienced in the field of development cooperation, I am all the more aware of the relevance of the projects of this organization, in adequacy with the contexts and the needs of the populations and its capacity to influence the public policies in its countries of intervention.

HEALTH

Better health for mothers and their children

RESULTS

In 2022, your help allowed us to:

- ▶ Support **8 health programmes** for **329,244** pregnant women, mothers and children in Bangladesh, Burkina Faso, Colombia, Guatemala, Madagascar, Nepal and Tanzania.
- ▶ Train over **4,334 health workers** in health education and advice for pregnant women.

BECAUSE THE HEALTH OF MOTHERS AND CHILDREN IS OUR PRIORITY

Mobilising communities to value their resources and knowledge in terms of health. Training health workers. Raising people's awareness of priority issues and influencing national policies. In 2022, these are still the four areas of support in the countries where Enfants du Monde operates.

Bangladesh – with the mothers

Maternal mortality during pregnancy and childbirth is 35 times higher in Bangladesh than in Switzerland. Enfants du Monde offers maternal and neonatal health education sessions, in villages and at home. In cooperation with our local partner BRAC, we also support communities and specialised services to improve the quality of care. A health system model where communities and health workers support each other through structured interactions is also being implemented.

In 2022, BRAC community health workers **provided information about the signs of danger** such as pain or bleeding **during pregnancy** and reminded about **preventive measures** against COVID-19 and other contagious diseases. As a result of such actions, **the health of nearly 30,000 pregnant women, young mothers, and over 7,000 newborns, was protected.**

Burkina Faso – digital solutions and communities at the service of health

We actively pursue the **training of health workers** in Burkina Faso where Enfants du Monde trained **4,000 health workers** in 2022 in the area of maternal and neonatal health, in particular on childbirth preparation and emergencies.

At the same time, Enfants du Monde provides the means for pregnant women to make informed decisions for themselves and their babies through the **free mobile application “My baby and me”**. Developed in 2020 in partnership with IPC/BF, Terre Innovative, the University of Ouagadougou and the Geneva University

Hospitals, it is available in several local languages. **Over 40,000 people use the application** in Burkina Faso and additional funds would enable us to further this offer.

In 2022, close to **100,000 pregnant women** received the childbirth preparation and emergency card and were able to prepare their birth plan with a health worker. Thanks to Enfants du Monde's programme some **183,000 children** have also been monitored.

Furthermore, Enfants du Monde continues to **involve communities** (village chiefs, women, husbands, teachers) to find solutions tailored to the context: promoting visits to health centres, improving nutrition, preventing domestic accidents, better communication with children, etc.

Colombia – a degree programme

Enfants du Monde, in collaboration with the Latin American Center for Perinatology of the Pan American Health Organization, WHO and the University of Antioquia in Colombia, has launched a **degree training course for health ministry management executives** in Latin America. It aims to train them in the community-based approach for promoting health to reduce maternal and neonatal mortality.

Training was held in Medellin, in Colombia and brought together **more than twenty participants from Colombia, Guatemala and Peru.**

Madagascar – improving care and preventing malnutrition

Enfant du Monde, in partnership with the University Hospitals of Geneva (HUG) and Terre Innovative, provides **training in maternal and neonatal health, for health care personnel.** A positive health care experience increases the number of consultations, thus preventing complications and reinforcing health-promoting behaviour. In 2022, **77 health care workers** from the District Hospital and the Urban Health Centre of Ambanja, in northern Madagascar, benefited from this training.

In parallel, in the same district, to prevent **chronic malnutrition** and in partnership with CO.P.E., Terre Innovative and the school district, we are informing and working with the communities and pupils in 3 schools on the principles of a healthy and nutritious diet. Malnourished students are also identified and counted. This programme has also created a school canteen which offers a balanced meal to school children. In 2022, **nearly 1,000 children and their families** benefitted from this project.

Nepal – introducing respect and trust to maternal and neonatal care

In the slums of Lumbini province in the south of the country, together with our local partner Green Tara Nepal, we **train health workers in respectful care and encourage pregnant women to consult** to improve their health and their babies'. Today, lack of interpersonal communication skills, ill-treatment during care, disrespect for confidentiality and privacy, and practic-

ing medical procedures without patient consent are widespread. In 2022, **more than 150 health workers** were trained, and **over 6,000 women** were provided with information relevant to their health, for example on danger signs during pregnancy for timely consultation at the right time, and on their rights to health.

Tanzania – preventing teenage pregnancies

Lack of information about sexuality, beliefs, taboos, and limited availability of health services contribute to health problems and early pregnancies among adolescents.

Since 2022, Enfants du Monde has been running a new programme in the rural district of Ulanga, in the south of the country, in cooperation with the NGO SolidarMed, to **improve the sexual health** of young people, based in particular on **the training of facilitators in sexual education** tailored to the needs of adolescents. Already 6 of them completed their training in 2022 and the programme targets **44,000 young people.**

Giving disadvantaged children a quality education

- ▶ Support **3 educational programmes** in favour of **118,038 pupils (both children and adults)** and train **3,720 teachers and teacher trainers** in Burkina Faso, Guatemala and Niger.
- ▶ Carry out **2 mandates** on behalf of the Swiss Cooperation in Niger and in Chad in order to improve the quality of national education systems for **572,581 pupils** and train **15,646 teachers and teacher trainers**.



BECAUSE WITH EDUCATION, WE BUILD OUR FUTURE

Recognise educational needs, design teaching materials, train the different people involved in education, innovate, follow and evaluate: these are the principles of a quality education promoted by Enfants du Monde. All this within a specific context: now, more than ever, it is necessary to adapt to the states of emergency on site, be committed to the most vulnerable and follow an inclusive approach as regards multilingualism.

Burkina Faso – having access to education even in a state of emergency

Burkina Faso, in particular in its northern half, has had to deal with attacks by armed group since 2015. This instability makes normal living impossible and it is expanding. At the beginning of 2022, more than 2 million internally displaced people were registered, among which 58% were children. Today, **more than one million schoolchildren are affected by the closing**

of their schools. This insecurity, combined with a governance crisis, led to a coup d'état in 2022 and an inflation rate estimated at 13.5% for the same year.

Sending displaced children to school

Thanks to the support of the Education Cannot Wait support fund, we continued **sending displaced children to school** in 2022 after their villages had been attacked, as well as the poorest children from the **welcome communities**.

A number of actions have to be carried out: build and equip **additional classrooms**, supply the schools with water access kits (storage barrels, tanks, basins and buckets), install school latrines, organise campaigns to **issue administrative documents** (birth certificates or identity cards), provide the children with school textbooks, **train facilitators**, and finally **supply food** for setting up canteens. Enfants du Monde also supports the Ministry of Education for the design and spreading of tools for an education to peace and citizenship.

Alongside, we also train parents' associations to better identify risky situations for their children and help them protect themselves, making school environments safer.

Continuing to provide quality education in state bilingual schools

In 4 areas situated around the capital city of Ouagadougou which have not yet been too affected by insecurity, Enfants du Monde continues to **support the national education system** by developing new teaching resources, training teachers and offering the children **a bilingual education** in French and the local language, Mooré, so that they can learn better and progress faster.

Guatemala – school outside the classroom when it is necessary

In many rural areas, schools stayed closed for more than 2 years during the sanitary crisis and only reopened at the end of 2022 in Guatemala. Enfants du Monde supported the Ministry of Education for the **implementation of educational radio programmes** that could be listened to at home. We have also reinforced the teachers' skills, in particular for designing materials for their **online or hybrid classes**. These are some of the interesting initiatives to be continued and offered in areas where access to school is limited.

With our local partner CIPREVICA and the Ministry of Education, we have **handed out sanitary protection kits to be used, amongst others, against COVID-19**, so that pupils can go back to school safely. Information sessions have also been organised to increase the awareness of schoolchildren, teachers and parents' associations about the COVID-19 protection measures at school.

Teaching adapted to the children's daily life, in Spanish and in Mayan language

More than 40% of the Guatemalan population belongs to one of the Maya ethnic groups, and many of them do not speak Spanish, the country's official language. **One Guatemalan out of five cannot read or write**. Apart from the language problem, **the teachers' training level** is low.

At the request of the Guatemalan Ministry of Education, Enfants du Monde implements a **bilingual and intercultural education programme** in schools in the Alta Verapaz and Chimaltenango regions, with our local partner CIPREVICA. More than **250 schools** are involved, i.e. a little more than **43,000 children**.

In order to facilitate reading, writing and arithmetic skills for Mayan children, the teams trained by Enfants du Monde and the local partners set up **teaching materials in Spanish and in the local Mayan language**. Anchored in the children's daily culture and environment, our bilingual manuals contribute to

their academic achievement and give value to Mayan identity, a challenge in a country where recent history has widely oppressed these indigenous populations. Enfants du Monde **also trains experts** who, in turn, will educationally support teacher trainers.

Niger – offering children a second chance

Enfants du Monde's programme « second-chance schools » finished in Niger at the end of 2022. In partnership with the Nigerian Organisation of innovative educators (ONEN in French), these schools offered primary education to disadvantaged children or ones who had never been to school.

Since 2018, **about fifteen classes have benefited from this programme** and 10 teachers have been trained. The last school leavers, who started in these schools in the Tillabéry region in 2018, have now finished their 4-year school career and are ready to pursue further studies and train for a job.

The infrastructures built during the programme will be put at ONEN's and government services' disposal, and will continue to host pupils.


BECAUSE THINKING ABOUT EDUCATION IN A SUSTAINABLE WAY INVOLVES IMPROVING THE NATIONAL EDUCATION SYSTEM

The expertise of Enfants du Monde in the field of quality education is recognized by the Department of Development and Swiss Cooperation (SDC) which entrusts us with two very important mandates in Niger and Chad. AFD is also a partner of Enfants du Monde in Chad.

Niger - providing alternative education to out-of-school youth

Many children and teenagers in Niger grow up in poverty and in a climate of insecurity. Often, they do not have access to education. To improve the situation, in 2014 the State of Niger developed with the municipalities, **Community Centers Alternative Youth Education**.

Enfants du Monde, in collaboration with the NGO Swisscontact, works in these centers for **out-of-school children aged 9 to 14**. An educational programme to acquire the basic knowledge for **social integration** and a future **transition to a professional training** is offered to them.

This alternative education offer is recognized and appreciated. In April 2022, a **ministerial decree** established Community Centers Youth Alternative Education in the Niger educational landscape – **which will now benefit out-of-school and unschooled youths across the country**.

In 2022, and in the 315 centers in the Dosso and Maradi regions where we operate, **8,176 students**, out of which 55% were girls, benefited from a quality education and **360 teachers** from continuous training. Thanks to the technical support of Enfants du Monde, **some guides and bilingual, multilevel and locally adapted textbooks** have been developed in four national languages (Fulfuldé, Hausa, Tamacheq, Zarma) promoting learning.

Chad – quality education and better trained children

In a country where rates of school dropout reach more than 50% in the first cycle, **4 out of 5 children cannot read or write** at the age of 12.

On behalf of the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation and the French Development Agency, **Enfants du Monde participates in the improvement of the national education system**

in 4 regions: Batha, Mandoul, Moyen-Chari and Wadi Fira.


Train teachers and their trainers

For 10 years now, our “Programme for the Quality of Basic Education” has offered continuous training to teachers and their trainers, thus creating a cascade training system that has benefited **ca. 16,000 people in 2022**.

Develop educational material rooted in the daily life and language of children

Enfants du Monde accompanies national trainers to design teaching materials rooted in day-to-day realities of the country: malaria, excision, access to drinking water, agricultural production, breeding, etc. Plurilingualism is emphasized to promote learning based on the language spoken at home by the children (for example sar), different from the official languages (French and Arabic). In 2022, 33 materials were distributed in **210,000 copies in 2,400 schools**.

The material developed for 6 to 8-year-olds has been recognized and validated by the authorities of the country, thus opening the door to their wider distribution at the national level. The one for the 9 to 10-year-olds is in the process of ministerial validation.

Making a difference with quality education

In 2022, **564,405 pupils**, out of which 43% were girls, benefited from the quality education provided by Enfants du Monde.

The 2022 evaluation of the “Programme for the Quality of Basic Education” of Enfants du Monde shows both at the beginning and at the end of school, that students in schools supported by Enfants du Monde obtain **better results** in language and mathematics than students from non-programme schools.

BECAUSE INTEGRATING ONE'S RIGHTS AT AN EARLY AGE ALLOWS TO BE MORE RESPECTFUL

Each year, Enfants du Monde allows Swiss-French pupils to study children's rights in class thanks to its programme "A Fairer World" and invites them to celebrate the International Day of Children's Rights during its festival "The Children's Voice".

A fairer world for children

We offer teachers in French-Speaking Switzerland an educational guide for children aged 8 to 12 to deepen their knowledge of children's rights. Enable children to be aware of their rights, identify with them certain injustices, raise their awareness of their own responsibility as citizens, these are the challenges of the programme "A Fairer World".

200 children participated in the programme in 2022 and creatively expressed what a world where children's rights are respected would look like. Each student was thus able to give his/her opinion on a right of his/her choice and to formulate recommendations to better enforce it.

A photo to express a right, a globe to share

Students took a **photo of a right that mattered to them**; all were exhibited on a Giant Globe almost 2 meters high. A Virtual Globe, the electronic version of the Giant Globe, is available online and allows pupils, parents and whoever wishes to remotely access all these photos as well as the recommendations made by the students.

A festival to celebrate

On November 18th, around 100 pupils who had participated in the "A Fairer World" programme went to the "The Children's Voice" festival organized in Geneva by enfants du Monde to celebrate the **International Day of Children's Rights**.

In the morning, they illustrated their recommendations through press cartoons during a workshop with cartoonist Patrick Chappatte. 


FINANCIAL DEVELOPMENT OF ENFANTS DU MONDE

FINANCIAL SUMMARY 2022

In 2022, Enfants du Monde continued working in priority intervention countries, and pursued the development of the new programs initiated in 2021 (Madagascar, Nepal, Tanzania), despite an increasingly difficult security context, particularly in Burkina Faso. Enfants du Monde must adapt its intervention to these emerging issues as some areas are no longer accessible. The mobilization of local organizations from these areas and from the communities makes it possible to limit the negative effects of this situation. In addition, Enfants du Monde is increasingly called upon to intervene in the education sector in emergency situations, particularly with internally displaced persons in Burkina Faso. COVID has also further impacted program delivery in Bangladesh and Guatemala (schools closed until September 2022).


Thus, expenses are decreasing compared to 2021. At the program level, although spending on some programs and mandates (last year of implementation of current phases) is decreasing, the level of spending due to the funds obtained in Education in Emergencies and the deployment of new programs is high. The drop in project costs is thus limited. With specific action taken at the end of the year to recruit new donors, fundraising and administration costs rose slightly but remained under control. These costs represent 10% of the charges.

Products in 2022 also show a decreasing result. This significant decrease in products received within the framework of the mandates was partly offset by the increase in funds received from partners that are active in Education in Emergencies (ECW, United Nations) and fundraising activities for institutions and the general public. The latter were particularly profitable, making it possible to significantly increase the products received through these channels (+20%). The 2022 accounts show, for the 5th consecutive year, a profit before allocation of funds and for the 1st time in nearly 10 years, a profit after allocation of funds! The free capital could again be endowed, a sign of the good financial health of the institution.
