#### Context

The concept of respectful care remains

**undertreated** in Nepal, despite the incorporation of the Right to Safe Motherhood and Reproductive Health Act in 2018. Mothers and newborns are not treated with respect: health providers do not inform women about medical procedures and most of them still request consent from husbands.

# Project

With technical and financial support of Enfants du Monde, Green Tara Nepal offers, **face-to-face and online trainings on Respectful Maternal and New-born Care** in three districts of Lumbini Province. These courses will soon be extended to other regions in cooperation with the National Health Training Centre, and will form an integral part of the Skilled Health Provider Training for both initial and refresher training.

### For whom?

**For health providers and supporting staff** working on maternal and new-born health in primary healthcare facilities.

## By whom?

Delivered by **trainers** from **National Health Training Centre, Green Tara Nepal** and Province Health Directorate, District and Municipality Health Offices.

### Where?

In the **districts of Rupandehi, Kapilvastu** and **Nawalparasi**, in Lumbini province in the south of the country.

# **Training objectives**

- Improve the quality of care by encouraging health care providers to change their behaviour;

- Promote the rights of pregnant women, mothers and newborns.

### How?

#### Train healthcare providers to respect women and new-borns through

- Providing information to mothers so that they can make informed decisions and give their consent;
- Ensuring **good communication** with mothers and children, showing respect and being non-judgmental;
- Guaranteeing women's privacy during treatment;
- Maintaining the **confidentiality** of medical information and data;
- Demonstrating empathy;
- Supporting mothers and encouraging the presence of a support person during childbirth;
- Supporting **breastfeeding**, infant care and the mental health of new mothers.

### **Training format**

#### Face-to-face:

- Paramedics: 5 days
- Nurses: 5 days
- Support staff: 3 days

**Online:** - Paramedics: 3 days - Nurses: 3 days



### **Benefits**

- Change the behaviour of health care providers through practical cases and action plans for person-centred care;
- Train a large number of health care providers at an appropriate pace thanks to the online option;
- Issue a certificate of attendance for course participants.
